Overcoming the initial struggles

Struggles are similar to investments that have a multiplier effect on the success we will achieve in the future. Everybody's life is filled with struggles as they begin new journeys. Similarly, I also confronted a variety of challenges when I came to Delhi for my higher education.





Accommodation and adjustments are prominent challenges one faces when they are moving to a strange place. However, I faced several other challenges at my college. Introduction of New Education Policy at the University of Delhi aggravated my challenges as I already had no one to guide me about the college curriculum and functioning, and when I could manage to speak with a few of the seniors they had no clue about the new syllabus and course pattern. Even Professors were not certain about the new procedures. With all the confusion in my mind I attended my classes and to my shock, I understood nothing nor did I have the courage to ask my professor to clarify my doubts. I had reservations about whether I would be able to fluently express myself in front of my class or not. The fear of making mistakes in front of my peers dragged me down and obstructed my learning.

We all know that a pessimistic person finds a problem in every opportunity while an optimistic one finds an opportunity in every problem and I have always been optimistic. My sheer determination was complemented by the efforts of my KARM family. They provided me with a buddy who helped me throughout my first year in navigating my college. The KARM team also supplemented our learnings with an English teacher (Mrs.Sujata Mehra) who was patient that I never felt that my questions would irritate her. I gave my undivided attention and participation to all my classes which yielded better returns for me. I could say proudly that I have improved a lot from her classes and will do even more in the future by taking responsibility for my growth. Additionally, Anoushka Mam's guidance in English helped me improve my communication. Thinking and articulation classes taught me the importance of being aware alongside the skills of comprehension and clear articulation. I owe all my confidence, fluency and optimism to my KARM Fellowship because this is the only place where I am never hesitant about making mistakes and learning from them. This attitude helped me build the courage to express myself and build a growth mindset.

In the heart of the KARM Fellowship, a momentous event took place - the very first Fellowship Day, which marked a pivotal milestone in the journey of self-realization and collective growth for its Fellows. This unique occasion brought together Fellows from both the cohorts. Before the Fellowship Day, my KARM journey revolved solely around the current cohort- our shared beliefs, dreams, and aspirations. However, now I realize that my career aspirations are not driven by external pressure; rather, they are fuelled by the desire to build a future for myself that includes my parents but also extends beyond their influence.

Considered prodigious, I have borne the expectations of my teachers, parents, and myself. The allure of an elite and prestigious career seemed a reality, especially after scoring a perfect 100% in grade 12 and emerging as CBSE national topper.



This transition paved the way for a steep shift in my thoughts and perspective. Transfeminism

"Don't make me feel less of a woman or a man; embrace my authentic self, for in diversity, empowerment stands."

I'm penning this article because I firmly believe that KARM's impact will transcend time. I am devoted to representing the queer community in the Fellowship. My aim is to foster a safer, inclusive space where future queer KARM members feel seen, heard, and valued.

Transfeminism represents the intersection between transgender and feminist ideologies, bridging the gap between transgender rights and feminist principles, aiming to dismantle oppressive systems affecting both communities. The journey of transfeminism begins with the struggles faced by transgender individuals in society. Discrimination, exclusion, body consciousness, abuse, and violence are rampant, leaving transgender individuals vulnerable and marginalised. The theoretical foundation of transfeminism highlights the need to challenge gender norms and stereotypes, cisnormativity, stigmatisation, dichotomy and transphobia, but translating these ideals into practical change can be a daunting task.

As a queer individual with an intricate relationship with gender, my journey starts amidst the obstacles imposed by society's patriarchal binary gender system. The rigid binary constructs of the world can feel suffocating, dictating the expectations of womanhood and manhood, leading us to internalise limiting gender stereotypes. Consequently, many individuals, including myself, find themselves confined to predefined roles that do not align with their authentic identity. Subsequently, the challenge arises of grappling with a lack of belongingness to my own body, causing shame and insecurity. Transfeminism asserts that society should honour the decisions made by transgender individuals concerning their bodies and gender expression.

Realising my true identity brought transfeminism's theoretical concepts to life, illuminating the intersectionality of struggles in feminism and queer activism. The 'new me' embraces authenticity, breaking free from societal expectations that do not align with my true self. Confidently expressing my gender identity, I have created safe spaces in college for myself and others, where I am known as "Ryu" - a name that feels more genuine than my birth name. Yet, the journey Is not easy, considering the challenges faced by trans/queer individuals in India.
